Leave No Trace Principle 6 Respect Wildlife

Your journey to becoming an environmental steward continues here! Follow the Tahoe Rim Trail through the 7 Leave No Trace (LNT) Principles to develop outdoor ethics and earn your Leave No Trace Awareness certificate! Now stay on trail to learn LNT Principle 6 - Respect Wildlife.



When you see wildlife, whether you are in a city park or desolate wilderness, it is important to respect it! This includes living animals and plants, as well as non-living natural objects like rocks and water. Before you go out in nature ask yourself, how can I keep wildlife wild?

THINK: Can you tell the difference between human wild? Look at the pictures on the right. Some are natural and wild, while others are man-made and harmful to nature. Check the correct box below each picture. Check the box to the left of the red symbol under pictures that show disrespect to wildlife and check the box to the left of the green symbol under pictures that are works of nature!

Correct The Disrespect

There are many things that disrespect wildlife and sometimes we might not even know we are doing it! See the signs of disrespect below and fix them! Next to each picture, write why you think it's disrespectful and correct it with the respectful thing to do instead.

Two Rolls Make a Right

Discover how you can respect wildlife, from a distance!

Here's the game - You are going to observe nature in your own backyard. The problem is, you don't have any tools! Grab two empty toilet paper rolls, a string or shoelace, and tape or 2 rubber bands or a stapler, and you'll have a pair of binoculars in no time. See the step-by-step directions below to build your binoculars and decorate them however you want! Once you're done, put them to the test!







Gather your materials:

Two empty toilet paper rolls, tape or two rubber bands or a stapler, yarn or a string or a shoelace.

Optional: Use markers, colored pencils, stickers, or construction paper to decorate it!

Connect the rolls:

If you are using a stapler, staple the rolls together on the inside. If you are using tape, wrap the tape around the rolls on the outside. If you are using rubber bands, space them out around the rolls to hold them together.

Attach the string:

Poke a hole on one end of each toilet paper roll, so that the holes are in the same spot on each side. Tie one end of the string through one of the holes, then tie the other end of the string to the other hole.

THINK: While you are outdoors using your binoculars, how can you make sure you are observing wildlife from a respectful distance?

HINT: Use your thumb! Hold your arm away from your body, give a thumbs up, and distance yourself far enough from the animal so that it looks no bigger than your thumb. Give it a try!

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Respect And Reflect!

Now take a picture of your binoculars and let's reflect!

1. How can binoculars be used to respect wildlife? Were you able to see any wildlife with your binoculars? Explain.

2. When respecting animals, how will their size determine how far away you should be? HINT: Think about the thumb rule!

3. What is one way people disrespect non-living things in nature? What can they do instead?

4. How does respecting wildlife connect with another Leave No Trace principle that you already learned? Which one? Explain.

5. Why do you think it's important to respect wildlife?

HINT: Trash makes wildlife less wild. Make sure you are disposing of your waste properly. In the Tahoe Basin, you should have a bear box or bear canister to keep the bears and other animals from eating your food and trash! Don't be that guy ->
